
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


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Seismic Travel Mount







SEISMIC TRAVEL MOUNT WITH REMOVABLE LIFTING ATTACHMENT

Artifact: Mino da Fiesole, *Julius Caesar* c. 1455-1460

Marble and limestone with traces of paint

This heavy mount was designed to provide handling capabilities for the stone work, *Julius Caesar*, without touching the delicate, friable surface. The object remained fixed in its mount during travel and installation. There are four removable clips at the bottom half of the mount and a large top clip fastened to a back bracket to gently spread any contact over a wide area while restraining the six degrees of freedom. The removable lifting attachment balances the artifact's verticality to facilitate installation and packing. The finish was sponged out in a complimentary color and texture to minimize the visibility of this large conspicuous mount.
